### Captains Corner by Captain(s) Dan Ruden and Ron Lawrence

Rocklin PD has experienced a lot of change over the course of the past two years. Interestingly, it was only five years ago we had eight police officer vacancies that we had difficulty filling due to the fierce competition of hiring personnel law enforcement. Today, we have frozen eight sworn officer positions, five professional staff, and one Public Safety Dispatcher position. Almost everyone has taken on additional duties to continue providing the highest level of professional service to our community. We eliminated about \$1.5 million from our budget and operational expenditures have been trimmed to bare minimum. We eliminated eleven vehicles and began leasing our unmarked cars to decrease costs. To help get the City through these difficult times the POA extended their contract foregoing raises, while police managers took furlough days, no raises and other concessions. While we continue to identify additional operational cost savings, we

recognize everyone has done a fantastic job working with the limited resources and budget constraints. Thank you for your continued efforts!

More change is looming on the horizon. While the economic situation remains uncertain, the next immediate changes will largely involve personnel, beginning with the retirement of Chief Siemens on March 31st. This Newsletter will be his last one at the helm of our organization. After a decade of service to Rocklin, it is easy to see the tremendous advancements Rocklin PD has experienced under Chief Siemens. We are housed in a state-of-the-art police facility, we are a nationally recognized CALEA accredited agency, and have won several State & national awards, including two for our outstanding Volunteer program. But the most important accomplishment Captain Ruden and I recognize is that of our talented and

dedicated staff who are committed to providing the most efficient, innovative and professional law enforcement services to the Rocklin community. We have achieved our vision of being known far and wide for excellence. We could not be more proud of the men and women who invest themselves in the mission and values of our organization on a daily basis. Yes, we've experienced tremendous change and certainly there is more on the way, but we are fortunate to have a great team to weather the storms and maintain our course.



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#### Report Writing Made Easy by Officer Zack Krempin



For those of you who love writing reports as much as I do, I found a way to make it easy. For a few

months now I have been testing an app I found for the I-phone. It's called Dragon Dictation. I do not know if it is available for other smart phones, but I think there are apps for those platforms as well. The Dragon app allows me to speak into my I-phone for a short time and the app then transcribes my spoken words into text. It can be a bit quirky, but after some experimentation and familiarization it has become a great asset.

I have been able to dictate a full multiple paragraph report in a few minutes. Now it does need some tweaking afterwards, but that is probably me being a little too meticulous with the dictation. It works great to make a rough draft or outline and then fill in the other portions for further explanation. It's very handy as it can be used anywhere, maybe while waiting for a medical clearance, waiting through the booking process or even in a parking lot after the incident is finished.

After the transcription is done, I usually just e-mail it to myself and then I copy and paste in

right into a report. Hope this tidbit can make your writing easier for you.

#### Rocklin Officers Find Missing Girl family misunderstanding prompts city-wide search by Captain Dan Ruden



On January 26th Dispatch received a call reporting a missing 9 year old girl at one of our elementary schools. The girl's mother went to pick her up after school but she was gone and nobody could find her. Rocklin Acad-

emy staff soon called for police assistance. Sergeant Dwyer and Corporal Dollar set up a command post (CP) at the school; they quickly initiated search protocol and began to direct resources to find the missing girl. As darkness was falling, the Day Shift supervision team coordinated a Citywide and semi-regional search effort which included police volunteers, citizens, surrounding agencies and even a satellite CP at the Galleria Mall to look for

a possibly associated vehicle. After nearly two hours **Officer Elizabeth Davis**, who was part of the search team, located that vehicle on Sunset Boulevard and the girl was located. Thankfully, no foul play had occurred and the missing girl was returned to her mother.

The Day Shift supervisors, officers and detectives, plus Rocklin's Police Volunteers, did an excellent job coordinating with the school, community members and allied agencies to bring this incident to a successful conclusion. Although the girl's missing status was only the result of a family miscommunication, the well executed response reminds us how prepared we are for more serious incidents of this nature, many of which start out the very same way.

The principal of Rocklin Academy wrote a letter to the Chief citing our staff's efficient response, professionalism and concern in the handling of this case. Keep up the great work!
