#### • Staff Recommendation:

#### **BACKGROUND:**

At the May 10, 2017 meeting, the Commission adopted a prioritized list of park projects. The prioritized list is intended to give recommendations to staff and council for how available park funding should be allocated.

#### **UPDATES**

- 1. **Johnson-Springview Water Play area.** It is anticipated that the Johnson-Springview Water Play area will be funded through park development fees. For FY 17-18, \$60,000 has been budgeted for design work and staff has contacted various suppliers of water play equipment for initial design discussions. Construction costs are expected to be funded in FY 18-19 also through park development fees. Kiwanis expressed interest in contributing funding to water play area or art component to enhance water play area. Once initial concepts are prepared, staff will present to the Commission for feedback.
- 2. **Trail development**. Staff submitted a grant application on 9/1/17 through California State Parks for the Outdoor Environmental Education Facilities Grant Program to request funds for trail construction. Staff is also working with Economic and Community Development staff to require that developers provide trail segments where trail sections have been identified in private development projects per the Trails Strategy and Action Plan. Current sections staff is working on include Quarry Loop Trail sections C, D & E.
- 3. **Rocklin 60 Park development.** We have broken ground on the Mini Park in the Rocklin 60 community. Based on feedback from the neighborhood meeting, staff was able to find an option which includes a slide structure as preferred by the area residents. Colors and other amenities were selected and the structure is being ordered this week. Bidding for the play structure installation will be soon for a projected late Fall completion. A grand opening will be planned once we have a completion date.
- 4. **Veterans Park development.** Rough design work complete. Included in CIP with estimated cost of \$245,000. Unfunded.
- 5. **Johnson-Springview Master Plan**. Staff will outline timeline, strategy and components and bring back to Commission in early fall. Will be largely completed in-house with some design work contracted.

- 6. **Finnish Temperance Hall outdoor improvements.** Included in CIP with estimated cost of \$130,000. Unfunded.
- 7. Front Street Plaza. Included in CIP with estimated cost of \$365,000. Unfunded.
- 8. **Whitney Ranch Park Phase II**. Community survey complete. No funding sources yet identified or timeline for design. Verbal update to be provided by City Manager.

#### **Memorial Park & Old Timers Park History**

At the July commission meeting, the commission approved a list of city parks, but directed staff to research the history of Memorial Park and Old Timers Park with the option to reconsider the list of park names pending the outcome of the research. Based on the research, staff does not recommend any changes to the list of parks approved by the commission.

Staff researched city archives as well as reached out to former councilmembers Peter Hill, Jerry Mitchell and Ken Yorde who have been involved with many park development projects and are knowledgeable of the city's history.

- Memorial Park/Quarry Park The area currently known as Memorial Park has changed names back and forth several times in its history. According to city documents:
  - In April 1945, through a resolution, a fund was established to receive donations for the creation of Memorial Park as a memorial to the members of the Armed Forces of World War II. The resolution notes the park is "on the lot surrounding the City Hall".
  - Records in the 80s and 90s, including General Plan documents and documents related to the creation of a Park Assessment District, refer only to Quarry Park. No mention of Memorial Park.
  - Documents from around 1999 and 2000 refer to Memorial Park. These documents mainly relate
    to a major remodel of the park including the removal of the wading pool and construction of the
    water play area.
  - Per Peter Hill, when he was elected in 1980, it was largely referred to as Quarry Park, but a couple of citizens involved with the city's history wanted it to be called Memorial Park. No official action was taken, but informally, the council at that time said the overall park was Quarry Park, but the veteran's area was Memorial.
  - Conclusion: Mr. Hill's recollections support city documentation that the majority of park history
    used the name Quarry Park. Though the name Memorial Park first was mentioned in 1945, it
    wasn't until recently that the name was used. It is likely that as part of the remodel around 2000,
    the Memorial Park sign was erected, but it is unknown as to why that name was selected at that
    time rather than Quarry Park.
- Old Timer's Park there is very little documentation about Old Timer's Park or when it first came into existence, but was one of the city's first three parks.
  - City records indicate that starting sometime in the 1970s, the city celebrated "Old Timer's Day", but there is no mention or connection of that event to the park.
  - The two plaques in the area provide information about the city's roundhouse operations near the site (city plaque) and the railroad as part of the Transcontinental Railroad (state historic marker).

- It is believed that the area was leftover right-of-way acquired when Rocklin Road was widened at some point.
- Per Peter Hill, according to a couple of long-time residents, the name of the park came about because old people used to go to this park, sit at picnic tables and play checkers. The park did not get much use, and in the 80s, the city proposed selling the land to the church on the adjacent property. One of the councilmembers was strongly opposed to the sale. Ultimately, the proposal to sell did not receive a majority vote.

#### Senior Activity Room A/C

Facilities staff have tested the A/C in the senior activity room and found it to be in proper working order and accurate. Staff is checking the thermostat prior to scheduled activities to regulate the temperature prior to the room being occupied.
