Lieutenant Mike Freeman rides the U.S.A. by Captain Ron Lawrence



Lieutenant Mike Freeman was a member of the Rocklin PD motor team for more than eight years and loves to ride. Now that he doesn't ride with the motor-cops any longer, he still rides a lot in his off-time. On April 28th, Lieutenant Freeman set off on his 2009 Honda Gold-Wing, riding the "Four-Corners" ride to the four corners of the United States, traveling 9,524 miles, all in only 16 days, averaging 613 miles per day. Leaving Rocklin, his first stop was San Ysidro, California, where he begin the first leg of the journey to Key West, Florida. Leaving the Sunshine State, Lieutenant Freeman made the next trek to Madawaska, Maine, and finally ending in Blaine, Washington before returning home to Rocklin. The Four Corners U.S.A. tour is sponsored by the privately operated group, Southern California Motorcycle Association (SCMA), and ride rules allow for the four cities to be visited in any order, but they must all four be visited within 21 days. Riders have to mail the official SCMA envelope to the sponsor from one of the

official checkpoints, along with a gas receipt from a service station in the checkpoint city, their odometer reading and one phone number

from a location listed on a special SCMA map furnished to participant riders. All riders must take a photo of their motorcycle at each corner checkpoint as well, with the background of a post office, police station or a landmark that clearly shows the checkpoint city name.

Lieutenant Freeman is no stranger to long, competition

rides. Over the past few years during his off-duty time he has represented the Rocklin community in the *Iron Butt Association* competition rides such as the *Saddle-Sore* 1000, *Bun-Bunner* 1,500, and *Bun-Bunner* 1,500 Gold which is a 1,500 mile ride in under 24-hours. His Four-Corner's ride will be a portion of the SCMA's *Triple-Crown*, which includes the Four-Corners ride, the California Park Adventure ride and Three-Flags classic. Good luck lieutenant, and keep the rubber side down!





Rocklin Police Volunteer Program Receives Service Award by Michael Nottoli

On Thursday, May 6, 2010, the Rocklin Police Department Volunteer Program received the California Volunteers Governor and First Lady's Medal for Service Award as the California Service Group of the Year. The award ceremony was held at the California Museum for History, Women and The Arts in Sacramento.

Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger and First Lady Maria Shriver spoke at the ceremony and paid tribute to volunteers and volunteer organizations in the following categories:

- California's Service Group of the Year Rocklin Police Volunteer Program
- California's Volunteer of the Year Kathryn Vaughn
- California's Business Volunteer Program of the Year Cisco Systems, Inc.
- California's Small Business Volunteer Program of the Year – Bay Federal Credit Union
- California's AmeriCorps Member of the Year Megan Mastache
- California's Nonprofit of the Year WriteGirl

On hand to receive the award from the Rocklin Police Department were Captain Ron Lawrence and Police Volunteers Robert Jordan, Becky Kanowsky, and Rich Vallone. The award was presented by Matthew R. Bettenhausen, the Secretary of the California Emergency Management Agency.

The Rocklin Police Department Volunteer Program was selected as the California Service Group of the Year because of its "demonstrable impact and unwavering commitment to the community." During the last 5 years, Rocklin Police Volunteers donated more than 55,000 volunteer hours providing an estimated \$1.2 million of service to the Department and community. The

program currently has 114 members performing more than 50 services including:

- Surveillance
- Traffic Control
- Vacation Home Security Checks

Although I oversee the program, much of the day-to-day management of volunteers is done by non-paid Volunteer Functional Coordinators Manuel Alcala, Danielle Bergmooser, Marsha Fries, Bob Jordan, Becky Kanowsky, Dave Kemp, Stu Lehman, Dave Lindsay, Rick Smeaton, Kathy Smith, Rich Vallone, and Frank Yoschak. These individuals help to recruit, hire, train, schedule, deploy, supervise, and evaluate the volunteers.

The Rocklin Police Department plans to hire an additional 17 Volunteers in 2010. Each new Volunteer must successfully complete a seven-step selection process and a comprehensive



50-hour, 14-session Volunteer Police Academy.
